Life in a Republic

The United States is a **democracy**. In a democracy, the people have the power to make decisions about government. The United States is set up as a representative democracy, or **republic**. In a republic, the people elect other people to make laws and run the government. This is different from a direct democracy. In a direct democracy, the people themselves make laws and run the government. Our republic is based on the United States **Constitution**. A constitution is a written plan of government.

The Role of Citizens

Citizens are members of a country. They play the most important part in the U.S. government. People born in the United States are U.S. citizens. People not born in the United States can become U.S. citizens. Citizens have several basic rights. Their rights include freedom of speech, freedom of religion, and the right to a fair trial. All citizens who are at least 18 years old have the right to vote. Citizens also have responsibilities. Some of these responsibilities are obeying the law, electing leaders, going to school, and respecting other citizens' rights.


We the People
